How to Judge a Member's Voting Record

Congressional Scorecard



AFSCME selects a few roll-call votes from the hundreds cast by members of Congress every session. In choosing these votes, AFSCME attempts to fairly represent a lawmaker's position on issues determined to be important to AFSCME members — first and foremost as workers, but also as citizens and union brothers and sisters.

This voting scorecard is one of the key factors used in making judgments on AFSCME campaign support, endorsements or contributions from PEOPLE — AFSCME's Political Action Committee or PAC. Other important factors often include the member's official leadership position, chairmanship or seniority on important committees, leadership in a state's congressional delegation, and accessibility and responsiveness to AFSCME's lobbying efforts.

2012 House Vote Descriptions

1. The Ryan Budget

AFSCME Position: NO

The budget resolution H.Con.Res. 112, crafted by Rep. Paul Ryan (R-Wis.), caps federal spending and makes major cuts in vital working family programs while cutting tax rates for the richest Americans and Wall Street. The Ryan budget would increase the number of Americans without health insurance by 30 million by repealing the ACA and end Medicaid as we know it by turning it into a block grant program. The resolution was adopted on March 29 by a vote of 228-191 (R: 228-10; D: 0-181). Roll Call vote 151.

2. Replacing Domestic Spending Cuts

AFSCME Position: NO

H.R. 5652 sponsored by Rep. Paul Ryan (R-Wis.) replaces billions in federal spending cuts under across-the-board cuts known as “sequestration,” with even deeper cuts in programs that are helping millions of families survive the worst economic recession since the Great Depression. Forty percent of the total \$324 billion in cuts comes from programs targeted to low- and moderate-income families, including food stamps, Medicaid, the Children’s Health Insurance Program and social services for vulnerable children, elderly and disabled poor. The bill passed on May 10 by a vote of 218-199 (R: 218-16; D: 0-183). Roll Call vote 247.

3. Violence Against Women Act Reauthorization

AFSCME Position: NO

The House bill (H.R. 4970) to reauthorize the 1994 Violence Against Women Act weakens many protections that exist under current law. In particular, it excludes lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) victims and fails to include key provisions needed to help reduce violence against young victims. The bill passed on May 16 by a vote of 222-205 (R: 216-23; D: 6-182). Roll Call vote 258.



4. Repealing the Affordable Care Act

AFSCME Position: NO

Shortly after the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the Affordable Care Act (ACA) was constitutional, the House held its 33rd vote to repeal the health care reform law. The ACA improves access to affordable health care coverage, provides

consumer protections, and reduces the federal deficit. If repealed, 1.2 million young adults would lose their coverage through their parents' health plan; 2.7 million seniors would pay higher prices for prescription drugs; 44 million seniors would be denied free preventive services; and insurance companies would be allowed to resume denying coverage, limiting care and spending premiums on larger CEO salaries and profits. The legislation passed on July 11 by a vote of 244-185: (R: 239-0; D: 5-185). Roll Call vote 460.

5. Middle Class Tax Cuts

AFSCME Position: YES

While debating a House bill (H.R. 8) to extend the Bush-era tax cuts for the nation's wealthiest 2 percent, an amendment was offered by Rep. Sandy Levin (D-MI) that would permanently extend tax cuts on income under \$250,000 for joint filers (\$200,000 for individuals), or about 98 percent of taxpayers and 97 percent of small business owners. The amendment would save the federal government nearly \$1 trillion over the next 10 years and provide much-needed revenue that could be invested in jobs, infrastructure improvements, education, and protecting programs like Medicare and Medicaid. The middle class tax cut was defeated Aug. 1 by a vote of 170-257: (R: 0-238; D: 170-19). Roll Call vote 543.

6. Tax Cuts for the Wealthiest Americans

AFSCME Position: NO

Not only would H.R. 8 extend the Bush-era tax cuts for the wealthiest 2 percent of taxpayers, H.R. 8 would also raise taxes on approximately 25 million middle- and low-income households.

Under this plan, the top 2 percent would get an average tax cut of \$150,000 per year, while programs for low-income families would be eliminated, including the refundable tax credit for college tuition, and the 2009 expansion of both the Child Tax Credit and the Earned Income Tax Credit. The tax cut for the rich passed on Aug. 1 by a vote of 256-171: (R: 237-1; D: 19-170). Roll Call vote 545.



7. Tax Cuts for Corporations and the Wealthy

AFSCME Position: NO

H.R. 6169 would fast track a plan to overhaul the tax code that would cut taxes for the wealthy and corporations, increase tax incentives for corporations that ship U.S. jobs overseas, raise taxes on the middle class, and increase income inequality and the federal deficit. The bill passed on Aug. 2 by a vote of 232-189: (R: 232-3; D: 0-186). Roll Call vote 552.
